Describe the rationale for the proposed program change(s):

Recognizing the increasingly interdisciplinary nature of contemporary art, the Department of Art proposes revisions to its MFA degree that provide students with a non-discipline-based and intellectually rigorous program of study. These revisions address two primary arenas: 1) simplification of the existing curriculum, 2) increased flexibility for interdisciplinary study. Emphasis is placed on a graduate student's independent studio work and the conceptual considerations that may derive from scholarship outside of art.

Specifically, the proposed changes are as follows with accompanying rationales:

1) Increasing the minimum art concentration credits from 24 to 36 In the past, the art "concentration" referred specifically to a discipline such as painting. If a student in painting also wished to study sculpture, for example, s/he could take more credits in sculpture through electives, thereby decreasing the total "concentration" credits. However, our overall move to an interdisciplinary system precludes the need for prescribed disciplines and regards the full range of students' studio practice as their "concentration." Therefore, the 36 total "concentration" credits reflect a deep commitment to personal investigation that is not impeded by categorical requirements.

2) Eliminating "cognate"

Admittedly, the "cognate" requirement dates back to a time before most of the present faculty joined the Art department; even senior faculty cannot actually recall its origins. As we understand it, however, "cognate" refers to coursework outside a student's area of specialization (formerly "concentration"), meant to insure some level of technical and creative breadth. Again the curriculum changes we propose embrace the value of breadth and infuse it with a directed, multidisciplinary approach. In other words, the spirit of the "cognate" requirement remains, but it is, in fact, absorbed into the nature of what we call "concentration."

3) Eliminating free elective and studio elective courses

Again, the actual elimination occurs in name only. The spirit of elective courses is reflected in our view of the "concentration" as comprehensive studio practice. As with the "cognate," electives are fully absorbed and valued in the overall number of "concentration" credits.

4) Combining separate supporting paper and exhibition courses into one course We regard the supporting paper as students' verbal articulation of their visual investigations. One does not evolve without the other, and certainly the two exist as complementary parts to a whole. Therefore, we choose to acknowledge and value this relationship through a single course. Moreover, we have no need to award credit for the MFA exhibition alone as it is the presentation of work done for a student's "concentration." The presentation of work on its own does not merit credit.

5) Adding 12 credits of critique

In the past, critiques existed as components of individual studio courses. That is, painting students would critique each other's work as would sculpture students and so on. Those dialogues remained discipline specific, however, and do not reflect the ongoing discourse in contemporary art in general or in our department specifically. In its contemporary form, the graduate "critique" course brings together graduate students from all areas of the department to share and critique work, exchange ideas, and challenge one another. Teaching of the course rotates among faculty each semester and, coupled with an intensive advising structure, encourages thinking beyond conventional boundaries. The critique experience serves as the foundation for an MFA candidate's education every semester. Its ultimate goal is to encourage artists to create intellectually rigorous work that is conceptually sophisticated and not medium dependent.

6) Adding a non-art academic course

Just as we acknowledge that contemporary artists no longer need to work in conventional categories, we understand the vital connections artists must make with scholarship outside of art. In demanding intellectual rigor and sophistication from our students, we ask them to explore related ideas in other fields that will stimulate their thinking and, consequently, their studio practice. We recognize the importance of an MF. Program within a larger University and encourage our graduate students to take advantage of the breadth of knowledge offered.

ART Revise MFA in Fine Arts- Prof. René Marquez

Dear Professor Marquez:

My apologies again for using a form letter.

The Faculty Senate Graduate Studies Committee recently met and went over your graduate program proposal. This is a summary of notations from that meeting.

Similar to your proposal to disestablish the MA in Art, the Academic Program Approval Form of the proposal for revision of the MFA in Fine Arts needs some editing. 1) Please state the action as "Revision of MFA program in Fine Arts." Since there is an MFA program in Theater, it is important to specify the program. 2) For each of the categorical changes you are proposing, provide more detail in the rationale to justify the changes. You are increasing the minimum art concentration credits from 24 to 36; eliminating cognate, free elective, and studio elective courses; going from separate supporting paper and exhibition courses to one combined course; adding 12 credits of critique; and adding a non-art academic course. These all need to be addressed in the rationale and justified. 3) We ask that you come to our next meeting on January 24 and join us at 10:00 a.m. to address our questions and receive any additional recommendations. The meeting will be held in the Arts and Sciences Conference Room located in the house at 164 S. College Ave. near the intersection with Kent Way.

Please make the changes or incorporate the suggestions stated above. If the changes or suggestions seem to be out of order, please specify why in your response. If necessary, I will take your response back to the committee for reconsideration. After completing these, send any updated electronic file or files if necessary of your updated academic approval form and any updated companion documents if appropriate as attached files accompanying an email to me
