1. Attain effective skills in oral and written communication, quantitative reasoning, and the use of information technology

We require majors to conduct research, give oral presentations as part of their capstone experience (senior Project). Our methods course aids them in analytical processes, and the research conducted by our faculty in collaboration with our students helps them to learn how to statistically analyze data, and present their findings at conferences and other venues.

2. Learn to think critically to solve problems.

The problem of being a member of a marginalized minority group, or a privileged majority group sets forth a dynamic that requires complex analytical tools. How to address these historically based problems and construct contemporary approaches to their solutions occupies a good deal of our curriculum and related activities. We believe the BAMS Major directly relates to this learning goal.

3. Be able to work and learn both independently and collaboratively.

We require independent study in our final senior project. This can be done by working with a faculty member in their research project, as an internship in a local agency, or an independent study under faculty supervision.

4. Engage questions of ethics and recognize responsibilities to self, community, and society at large.

We address systematic forms of social injustice, including factors that sustain it and forms of resiltence in response to it. The broader question of racism directly addresses concerns for broader society's obligations to treat people fairly.

5. Understand the diverse ways of thinking that underlie the search for knowledge in the arts, humanities, sciences and social sciences.

For the general Major, we have identified "Pillars" which constitute distribution requirements in Comparative and Diasporic Studies: Social and Behavioral Sciences, Arts and Humanities and History. These Pillars reflect the fact that Black American Studies is

inherently multidisciplinary and the best way to understand the African Diaspora is from these multiple disciplinary perspectives. We further require a research methods course that has the explicit goal of enabling students to critically analyze the influential aspects of the Diasporic experience and the consequences they have for the mental, physical and social well-being for people of African descent.

7. Develop the ability to integrate academic knowledge with experiences that extend the boundaries of the classroom.

We encourage students to become involved in community projects in collaboration with faculty or by taking internships and field research. Many of our faculty conduct field research and this extends the classroom experience both experientially and intellectually. Our faculty engages students in their research at every opportunity.

8. Expand understanding and appreciation of human creativity and diverse forms of aesthetic and intellectual expression.

By working closely with the Paul R. Jones Initiative, we encourage students to take the art and Art history courses that address images of the African Diaspora and encourage uses of these images across a variety of academic disciplines. The aim is to allow students to approach their academic work from different perspectives and art is a very important one. We also encourage students to engage in a variety of arts, literary activities including poetry readings, special collections of African American writers, University Museums holdings and exhibitions, and dance and theatre productions. All of these activities further engagement in the artistic experiences of the African Diaspora.

9. Understand the foundations of United States society including the significance of its cultural diversity.

This is a core aspect of the entire BAMS curriculum. We sponsor a broad set of courses that cut across ethnic, racial, cultural and gender relevant courses. We encourage comparative analysis as a means of better understanding differences as well as similarities amongst human groups.

10. Develop an international perspective in order to live and work effectively in an increasingly global society.

We support three different study abroad courses in South Africa, Ghana and Barbados. We provide scholarship support for BAMS Majors who take study abroad courses because we firmly believe that the international experience of the African Diaspora regions is crucial to the understanding we want to impart through a BAMS major. We also address international issues in our BAMS curricultum.

History. HIST/BAMS134 is required in the new Major but it is already required in the current Minor.

Describe the rationale for the proposed program change(s):

We proposed a new Major in Black American Studies in 2006 and it was approved and took effect in 2007. Our rationale for the major was that we had many students who had previously declared BAMS as a minor, but who told us they would have declared it as a major if that had been possible. Our thinking at the time was that many who declared a BAMS majors would want to add it along with majors or minors they had already declared so we wanted it to be maximally flexible. As a result, we had only three required courses. We have realized that this provided too much latitude and the content we want to teach was not going to be reliably obtained. As a result, we have modified the Major to include 19 required credit hours instead of ten. Specifically we have added History of Africa (HIST/BAMS 134; and a choice between Contemporary African American Issues (BAMS205) and Survey of African American Culture (BAMS206); and a choice between History of Black America to the Civil War (BAMS304/HIST325) and History of Black America since the Civil War (BAMS306/HIST326). In addition, we have separately proposed adding three new concentrations. This provides us another way to create flexibility within the curriculum. We anticipate that students can get the basic BAMS curriculum which will provide breadth as well as a core set of courses, or they can focus on courses that may be more relevant to their career goals in say, public policy, graduate studies, professional school tlaw) or journalism. We are confident that the revised major requirements will more effectively serve our educational nurposes and the students' interests and needs.
