requirement. One of the new options we hope to add is STAT 200. Here are the options we are proposing (one of the following):

MATH 202: Introduction to Statistical Methods II, or
MATH 205: Statistical Methods, or
PSYC 209: Measurement and Statistics, or
SOC1 301: Introduction to Sociological Research, or
STAT 200: Basic Statistical Practice.
