# Master of Music Degree

#### THE DELAWARE ADVANTAGE

The University of Delaware provides graduate students with the stimulating environment of a comprehensive research university plus easy access to the major metropolitan centers of Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington D. C. and New York. Music study at Delaware is enriched by the well-equipped and modern facilities in the Amy E. du Pont Music Building with its large rehearsal rooms, practice facilities, Loudis Recital Hall, and Music Resource Center, as well as the excellent collection of scores, books, and music journals housed in Morris Library. The Louise and David Roselle Center for the Arts, opened in the fall of 2006, provides state-of-the-art practice, rehearsal, electronic music and performance venues.

At the heart of the program are the members of the music faculty — all professionally active performers, composers, music educators or music historians. Their accomplishments are reflected in the numerous awards, publications, recordings and performances that serve to underscore their artistry and scholarship and increase their national and international prominence. This community of artists and scholars provides an ideal atmosphere for graduate study in music.

Teaching assistantships and tuition scholarships are available for graduate students in music on the basis of the applicant's demonstrated talent and skill as related to departmental needs. Applicants interested in being considered for any of these awards should indicate their interest on the application form.

# **ADMISSION PROCEDURES**

- 1. Applicants for admission must have earned a bachelor's degree in music, or an equivalent diploma or certificate as determined by the Department of Music, with an acceptable grade point average (normally 3.0).
- 2. Applicants should complete the Graduate Admission Application electronically online. The application is available at http://www.udel.edu/gradoffice/applicants. Those wishing to be considered for tuition waivers and graduate teaching assistantships must make application no later than March 15. Awards will be announced by April 15.
- 3. Three letters of reference are required and are sent online directly to the Graduate Office. Performance Concentration candidates should include a letter of reference from an applied teacher. Teaching Concentration candidates should include at least two letters from supervisors or administrators.
- 4. Performance Concentration candidates must audition with a 20-minute program of appropriate literature showing contrasting styles. Please contact the Department of Music to arrange an audition. Note audition deadlines on page 6. Composition Concentration candidates must submit three composition scores with recordings of a variety of works, and one research paper. In addition, each candidate must pass the Graduate Theory Placement Exam before being accepted into the program.
- 5. Arrange to have each institution of higher education you have attended send one official transcript of your college records directly to the Office of Graduate Studies. Students with an undergraduate degree from the University of Delaware do not need to arrange for transcripts to be sent.

# ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

A maximum of nine credits taken through the University of Delaware's Division of Continuing Education may be applied to the requirements of the degree Master of Music.

All graduate students are strongly encouraged to take the diagnostic exam in music theory and the comprehensive exam in music history as early as possible in their course of study. Students must take and pass the music theory diagnostic exam prior to enrolling in MUSC 695 (Advanced Analytical Techniques), and those students who receive financial support must take and pass the comprehensive exam in music history before entering their second year of graduate study in order to continue to receive support. More information on these exams is available on the Music Department's Graduate Studies website.

Activities assigned to music graduate students with tuition scholarships and teaching assistantships have included, but are not limited to: Assisting in Music Theory and History courses; teaching Private Study to non-majors; teaching Class Voice; working in the Ensemble Library. In addition, there are assistantships which are specifically for work with the Marching Band and the Graduate String Quartet.

#### **IMPORTANT DEADLINES**

March 15 Application deadline for students to be considered for tuition scholarships and teaching assistantships.\*

April 1 Application deadline for summer admission – application form, transcripts, and letters of reference due.

April 1 Performance Concentration candidates must audition by this date for summer admission.

June 1 Performance Concentration candidates must audition by this date for fall admission.

July 1 Application deadline for fall admission – application form, transcripts, and letters of reference due.

Application deadline for spring admission – application form, transcripts, and letters of reference due.

December 1 Performance Concentration candidates must audition by this date for spring admission.

\* Tuition scholarships and teaching assistantships are given by school year; therefore this deadline corresponds with fall admission.
