Our Chair Gretchen Bauer has spoken with Avron Abraham from the Office of Undergraduate Studies about returning our majors to the general pool of freshmen to meet their FYE requirement. ### Describe the rationale for the proposed program change(s):

Delete - POSC 241: Exploring International Relations Major would be reduced by one credit to 51.

In fall 2005, the Department of Political Science and International Relations added a new one credit course requirement for its political science majors, POSC 241. This class satisfied the freshmen year experience (FYE) requirement for our majors. The course was run largely as a discussion section to POSC 240, Introduction to International Relations, and did not fulfill the goals of the FYE program. In the intervening years, the goals of the FYE program have become clearer and most of them are not fulfilled by our course, POSC 241. So, for example, our POSC 241 does not include sessions on alcohol awareness, safer sex, and conflict management. The classes are not interdisciplinary in terms of student majors and the classes do not make use of a common reader as happened this fall semester. Moreover, because the class is currently a required part of the major it must be taken for a grade whereas most FYE classes are pass/fail. Finally, the class is a drain on department resources as we have been assigning graduate students to teach the classes who could be serving as teaching assistants to our larger classes. (Alternatively, we would have to pay 2 "S" contracts to cover our six sections of POSC151 and POSC241.) Paradoxically, five of our faculty served as faculty for UNIV FYE classes

this fall, though none of them were teaching any of our majors. For all of these reasons we would like to delete the POSC 241 requirement and have our students join the larger freshmen class in taking their FYE requirement outside their major.

### **Program Requirements:**

International Relations is an interdisciplinary major in the College of Arts and Science with core (24 credits), concentration (18 credits), and regional specialization (9 credits) requirements. Students must choose one of four concentrations and one of five regional specializations, as detailed in the curriculum below. An honors degree option is available. All POSC courses taken for the IR major requires a minimum grade of C- or better. Students must also receive a C- or better in 30 of the 51 required credit hours and have a cumulative average of 2.0 in the 51 required hours.

# Area Studies and the International Relations Major:

Students whose regional specialization is Africa, East Asia, or Latin America should give serious consideration to adding one of the university's Area Studies programs: African Studies, East Asian Studies, European Studies, Islamic Studies and Latin American Studies. Course work in these area studies programs will allow students to develop much richer and deeper knowledge of these regions. Moreover, most of the courses approved for the Regional Specialization within the International Relations major are also approved as fulfilling the Area Studies requirements thereby facilitating a minor or double major with an area studies program.

# Study Abroad, Internships, and Undergraduate Research:

International Relations majors are strongly encouraged to consider a study abroad experience as a part of their program. Students participating in study abroad programs not only enrich their education through exposure to foreign cultures, but often have the opportunity to take courses, internships, and undertake other educational experiences abroad not otherwise offered in University of Delaware course lists. In many instances, these courses may count towards IR Concentration and Regional Specialization requirements. Similarly, internships and undergraduate research experiences offered from the Newark campus may be applied to IR Concentration and Regional Specialization requirements. Students should check with the Director of Undergraduate Studies when enrolling in study abroad courses and programs, internships, and undergraduate research programs to determine if the specific course, program, or educational experience meets a particular IR major requirement, or, if some major requirement might be waived by means of study abroad, internships, or undergraduate

research programs.

# **Transfer Students:**

Students changing their major to international relations must have a minimum grade point average of 2.0. Students transferring to the major from outside the University of Delaware will have their transcripts evaluated by the director on a case-by-case basis.
