SGST/WOMS308: Theories of Sexuality and Gender: This course examines the major theoretical approaches to the study of sexuality and gender with an emphasis on queer theory and intersections between sexuality, gender, race, class, and nationality.

The addition of a Theories of Sexuality and Gender Studies course will fulfill the following goals of undergraduate education: 1. The course will include written and oral communication including class discussion and presentations and written assignments. 2. Students will understand queer theory as a body of literature that provides tools for critical thinking and analysis by looking at the ways queer theory engages with more mainstream literature in other disciplines. Through readings, discussion, and writing assignments students will learn to apply the critical tools of queer theory to think about contemporary politics and society. 3. Assignments in the course will include individual and collaborative efforts. 4. The course will encourage students to think critically about different ways of thinking about sexuality and the political, moral, and ethical implications of each, 5. This course will examine how queer theory has engaged with and criticized bodies of knowledge from a variety of disciplines including the humanities, social sciences, and natural sciences. Students will be encouraged to think about how different disciplinary frameworks examine questions of sexuality and will engage with questions about the consequences of these different approaches. 6. Students will have the opportunity to read and discuss challenging texts that will require them to develop and utilize critical thinking and communication skills. 7. Students will be exposed to a new body of literature and a variety of ideas about sexuality that will enable them to think critically about social and cultural understandings of sexuality. These tools will be applicable beyond the classroom to their daily lives in images of sex and sexuality in the media, discussions of sex and sexuality in politics, and in personal choices about sex. 8. Students will be exposed to a new and diverse body of literature (queer theory). 9. Students will examine questions of cultural diversity around issues of sexuality in the United States and globally looking at variations in the understanding of and study of sexuality across time and across cultures. 10. Readings and discussions will include global perspectives on sexuality.

WOMS is removing PHIL/WOMS215 from their curriculum and developing a Feminist Theory and Methodology course designed for their majors. We are proposing to add a Theories of Sexuality and Gender Studies course in order to introduce our minors to the theoretical foundations of the study of sexuality and gender, tailored to the specific needs of our students. PHIL327/WOMS277/BAMS327 Race, Gender, Science is infrequently offered so we are changing it to an elective course rather than an option to fulfill the required courses.
