COMBINED 4+1 BS in Human Services/MS in Human Services Leadership

The four-year curriculum for the Bachelor of Science in Human Services contains required graduate courses that prepare the student for the Master in Science curriculum. With this 4+1 plan and the proper scheduling of MS classes, students may enter immediately into the MS program full-time with the possibility of completion within one year.

UD Human Services (BS) undergraduate majors who are provisionally granted admission to the 4+1 MS HDFS program/Human Services Concentration and subsequently admitted to the MS HDFS program can waive the requirement to take a) HDFS 470 or HDFS 475 by completing HDFS 601, b) HDFS 422 by completing HDFS 621, and c) HDFS 449 (3 credits) by taking HDFS 669 (3 credits). For any undergraduate course requirement to be waived, the student needs to earn a grade of B (3.0) or better in the corresponding HDFS graduate course. In addition, students who are provisionally approved can take up to three additional 3-credit graduate courses, while an undergraduate student, toward the 33 credit MS requirement. ^{*}Courses must be focused on the delivery of services to individuals and disabilities or in risk situations and/or their families. These services can include residential, employment, health and medical, transportation, family support or other specific services.

- 3. Defense: A presentation and oral defense is required for all the thesis.

HDFS 637 Program Planning, Assessment and Evaluation will now be a required course across all MS concentrations. The rationale for this is that this Master's degree is an applied degree and students should have exposure to program planning and the opportunities and challenges that are an integral aspect of both Early Childhood and Human Services delivery programs.

- 1. Attain effective skills in (a) oral and (b) written communication, (c) quantitative reasoning, and (d) the use of information technology. Students will apply these competencies to more complex content and develop them further in this course that requires them to analyze statistical and qualitative data in culminating projects or papers.
- 2. Learn to think critically to solve problems. The UD Conceptual Framework for all programs preparing educational professionals emphasizes students' development as problem-solvers. Coursework in HDFS 637 prepares students to analyze issues, ideas and individual needs, gather relevant information and propose, implement and evaluate actions in response.
- 3. Be able to work and learn both independently and collaboratively. The balance of independent learning and application of learning established throughout the MS program continues as students

- work on course-related projects with faculty teams on research and community work as well as independent learning in their areas of interest.
- 4. Engage questions of ethics and recognize responsibilities to self, community, and society at large. Course content and related work in communities off-campus provide multiple opportunities to students to learn to apply this Code.
- 5. Develop the ability to integrate academic knowledge with experiences that extend the boundaries of the classroom. All programs in HDFS apply academic knowledge to structured and supported experiences the communities. Students in this course have additional opportunities alone and as participants with faculty in direct service to children, families, programs and policy makers.
