ANTH101 – Introduction to Social and Cultural Anthropology and ANTH/MCST/HIST216 – Introduction to Material Culture Studies these courses support the interdisciplinary nature of the fashion and apparel studies field using social, historical, aesthetic and cultural contexts.

The Minor in Fashion History and Culture supports the 10 goals of undergraduate education in several ways. In particular, this combination of courses will examine clothing and appearance from both historical and contemporary perspectives and through analysis of cultural differences. Goal 5- an understanding of the diverse ways of thinking that underlie the search for knowledge in the arts, humanities, and social sciences; Goal 8- expand understanding and appreciation of human creativity and diverse forms of aesthetic and intellectual expression; and Goal 10- develop an international perspective in order to live and work effectively in an increasingly global society.

The courses required for the proposed minor draw on the interdisciplinary nature of the fashion and apparel studies field using social, historical, aesthetic and cultural contexts (Goals 5 & 8) to develop an understanding of the influence of clothing and appearance on the global society (Goal 10). Four of the courses in the proposed minor are approved Arts & Sciences Group B electives (FASH 214, FASH 224, FASH 319 and ANTH101). Further, FASH 213, FASH 319 and ANTH101 are approved multicultural courses. In addition, ANTH344 is an approved Arts & Sciences Group A elective. These courses develop students' understanding of the factors underlying the dress of peoples around the world as well as the global influences on contemporary dress. Courses in the minor will provide students opportunities for learning through a variety of oral, written and visual outcomes: exams, journaling, written and oral research reports, team and individual research projects, and hands-on experiences with objects in the Historic Costume and Textiles Collection.

- 1. The criteria admitting students into the minor is unnecessarily restrictive. FASH 114 is not a prerequisite for all the courses in the minor.
- 2. We are adding ANTH101 and/or ANTH/MCST/HIST216 Introduction to Material Culture Studies to expand the opportunities for students outside the department to be able to enroll in the minor.
- 3. ANTH334 is a misprint in the minor curriculum; the correct course number is ANTH344 Anthropology of Clothes.

Minor in Fashion History and Culture

Current Curriculum

The Minor in Fashion History and Culture provides a unique opportunity for students to develop an understanding of the origins and evolution of dress and fashion in relation to global societies and cultures. Clothing and appearance (i.e. dress) are forms of non-verbal communication. Varying social, national, ethnic and gender groups project their identities through their dress. When examined from both historical and contemporary perspectives, as well as through analysis of cultural differences, clothing and appearance contribute to our understanding of the world. As an interdisciplinary subject, the development and importance of dress and fashion from pre-historic times until present day incorporates historical, economic, aesthetic, technological, social and cultural factors that influenced clothing change.

The minor is open to students majoring in any academic discipline and across all colleges. The minor is awarded only to students who have applied and been admitted to the program. Applications to be admitted into the minor are submitted on-line through UDSIS. Admission will be based on the cumulative GPA of 2.0 and the completion of at least 28 credits at the University of Delaware prior to application.

The credits required for the minor may also be used to meet other distribution requirements, such as degree major requirements and electives. Students seeking a minor in Fashion history and Culture may not take more than 6 credits of of the required fashion courses at another institution.

The Minor in Fashion History and Culture requires a total of 18 credits of course work. A minimum grade of C- is required for all courses included in the minor.

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I am writing to follow up on our discussion a couple of weeks ago about incorporating an Anthropology course into the Fashion History and Culture Minor offered in the Fashion and Apparel Studies Department.

We would like permission to include as electives:

ANTH 101 - Introduction to Social and Cultural Anthropology

and/or

ANTH/MCST/HIST 216 Introduction to Material Culture Studies

These would be electives to replace our FASH 114 which is going to be phased out of the curriculum. I estimate 15 students a year would enroll in either ANTH 101 or 216. Note ANTH 344 is already an approved elective (so you should have several of our students enroll in it this spring)
