# Disability Services Leadership and Management Specialization Master of Public Administration Program

# School of Urban Affairs and Public Policy University of Delaware

The program in public administration is jointly offered by the School of Urban Affairs and Public Policy and the Department of Political Science and International Relations. The mission of the University of Delaware's Master of Public Administration program is to provide, diverse, talented graduate students with specific competencies for leadership and management, including the knowledge, skills and values essential to accountable and effective practice. The MPA program contributes directly to solutions to public challenges of our times through research and public service projects that involve students in experiential learning. The program also seeks to develop relationships with practitioners, fostering a professional focus and approaching public administration and nonprofit management and furthering the values of the field. The Disability Services Leadership and Management Specialization adds to the management focus of the MPA program coursework and fieldwork focusing on contemporary practice in the field of community-based services and supports for people with disabilities. The disabilities field in a combination of federal policy and funding, with state and local (depending on the state) governments and the private nonprofit sector as the primary implementers of services and supports. Increasingly, services are implemented through contracts from government to the private nonprofit sector. In some states, there is a robust for-profit sector as well.

MPA candidates are required to complete 42 credit hours to earn the degree. The curriculum consists of core requirements, specialization courses, an internship for those at entry level or changing their careers, a writing requirement, and an Information Technology requirement.

Students may choose from one of the following specialization areas or may design their own with the advice of an advisor and program director approval.

- Community Development and Nonprofit Leadership
- Financial Management
- Health Policy and Management
- Organizational Leadership
- State and Local Management
- Disability Services Leadership and Management Specialization (This proposal)

## **Disability Services Leadership and Management Specialization**

## **Description**

Course work in the Disability Services Leadership and Management Specialization builds on the management focus of the MPA program and is designed to increase (1) leadership skills, (2) understanding of the relationship of service systems to individuals with disabilities and their families, (3) understanding of policy decision-making at the local, state, and federal levels,

and (4) understanding of program and evaluation research. Students pursuing this specialization focus on current critical issues in management, leadership, and disabilities studies from a variety of theoretical and applied perspectives. The program emphasizes a strong background in human development and the rights of people with disabilities, the study of individuals with disabilities and their families in a multicultural context, and the development, management, and evaluation of programs for individuals with disabilities in diverse and inclusive community settings.

Students are prepared for leadership positions in public and private human service organizations, community agencies and local, state, and federal government organizations where they will have the skills to work directly with programs supporting individuals with disabilities and their families; design and administer high quality programs; and/or evaluate disabilities-focused programs.

Services for people with disabilities are primarily funded by government and mostly delivered through the private sector. With the exception of some short-term rehabilitation programs and some short-term acute psychiatric inpatient programs, there is very limited private money in this field. Virtually all of the funding comes from government, at least the funds that are spent on formal services. Thus, there is a natural relationship between the MPA program and Disability Services Leadership and Management (DSLM) specialization.

### **Research Center Affiliation**

The DSLM specialization is supported by the active research and public service programs of the **Center for Disabilities Studies (CDS)**. Most full-time students who choose DSLM as their specialization will work on CDS projects.

### Courses

In addition to the MPA core requirements, students specializing in DSLM are required to complete at least 6 credit hours of general coursework within the area as well as Leadership for Vulnerable Populations (course description below). Several courses now under consideration/development and included on the elective lists below as "placeholders."
